The 9th December 2021 is significant in that it marks 50 years to the day the last Rifle Company, Victor Six (V6), was withdrawn from the Republic of South Vietnam. Christchurch being the departure point for the RNZIR Infantry Companies made this the logical choice of venues for staging our National Reunion 2021.

I can recall that the New Zealand Vietnam Veterans have paraded down Auckland once and twice through Wellington, but never in Christchurch.

Time is moving on, and so has life challengers. In view of this it is timely to advise that those veterans over the 75% NZ Veterans Disability threshold, that you may use the Travel Concession from Veterans Affairs. We recommend that you go to the NZ Veterans Affairs website and check it out.

On a separate note, we’re proud to announce, the Manurewa Returned Services Association is now the official home of the New Zealand Vietnam Veterans Association. A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) has been signed, sealed and delivered. Returning to my birth place.

The above proverb relates to the people of Tainui Waka living in Kawhia centuries ago prior to them dispersing to the four winds of Aotearoa / New Zealand and it also relate to my returning home.

I retired from working 15 January 2021 and sold my home at Weymouth Auckland, and brought a retirement Bach in Kawhia.

Saturday 26 February 2021, I was invited by David Stone, The Principal -Te Mata Law Ltd, Barristers and Solicitors Chancellors, to attend a Special presentation of medals at Pakipaki, Hastings, by the Defence Force to four families of soldiers who have passed on who served in D Company of the 28 Maori Battalion, who never received their Medals on their return home from WW2.

Present was Mr Robert Bom Gillies of Te Arawa the only surviving member of B Company of the 28 Maori Battalion. The Rt. Hon, Meka Whaitiri, Minister for Veteran Affairs, including Defence Force, Navy, Army and Airforce, fellow veterans and the public, Total of over 300 people attended to witness this historical event.

17 April 2021, is the next presentation at C. Company Building, Gisborne. 50 to 60 families will be presented to receive medals from Defence Force that their fathers and uncles who served in C Company, 28 Maori Battalion also did not receive their medal's on returning home to Aotearoa / New Zealand.

The question was asked why? There are many theory's, I was told that, many changed their name and age so they could join the Army, so on their return home they either return to their original name or address unknown. Another was that, members of the 28 Maori Battalion preferred to have the medals presented rather than have it mailed to them. My late father in-law who was shot in

the hip by a German Stuka dive bomber, used to say to my son, He did not want his medals because it did not put bread on the table. My father in-law went on to become a very successful farmer at Omori Tokaanu, Turangi. He was Tiger Raroa of Ngaati Porou who served in C.Company 28 Maori Battalion.

This kaupapa was the brainchild of David Stone, Ngaati Kahungunu, Pakipaki ki Heretaunga. Three years ago, while at home on Annual leave, he asked his father if he had his grand-uncle's medals, his father said no, so with the relevant information he received from his father he rang Medal Section Wellington. Medal Section told him that, according to their records his grand-uncle never received them. From this information David said quote "I started to wonder how many more did not receive their medals. So began the long arduous task researching and found that well over 300 did not receive their Medals who served in the second world war. So, he decided to concentrate only on the 28 Maori Battalion because this is the unit his grand-uncle served in.

He never ever received any funding from Government. He did take his kaupapa to the Waitangi Tribunal and it was put before the Crown and was turned down. And it became a one-man crusade. He rang me who should he contact at Medal Section, I told him to contact Jack Hayes who may help him. And his research went from there. He kept updating me of where he was at and also went on National TV to promote what he was doing and including Radio Waatea.

His efforts have been rewarded with Defence Force presenting the Medals to the families and will continue around the country.

At Pakipaki I was asked by one of the public at the hui, "if perhaps David may have opened up a can of worms", I said "no I do not think so, because this kaupapa is not only for the 28 Maori Battalion but also other Battalions who served in the New Zealand Division during World War 2 and I do believe it will be on-going, but it will be up to their representative to do their own research, I would imagine..

My relationship with David. He and my son went to Hato Paora College in Feilding and both went on to University. David went onto Law School Wellington University and my son Waikato University studying GIS. David also represents my tribe at the Waitangi Tribunal Hearings and so do my son with Mapping.

In terms of our Rifle Company reunions this year 2021; I understand that Victor Three Company will be holding

their Reunion in Christchurch in June including Victor Two in November at Te Awamutu and Victor Six who will celebrate to honour and remember their withdrawal from Vietnam 50 years ago in Christchurch 10 – 14 December 2021.

My apologies to the other Companies and units, as I do not have their reunion dates.

Our National Body, 'New Zealand Vietnam Veterans Association' (NZVVA), will also hold our National Reunion in Christchurch 6 – 9 December 2021.

Finally, I am enjoying my retirement in Kawhia.

PRIVACY ACT

A new Privacy Act came into effect on the 1 December 2020. The Privacy Act 2020 (the Act) repeals and replaces the Privacy Act 1993.

The Act strengthens privacy protections. It promotes early intervention and risk management by agencies (the name used for any organisation or person that handles personal information) and enhances the role of the Privacy Commissioner.

The Privacy Act has 13 information privacy principles which set out how the NZVVA should handle personal information. Under the Privacy Act, the NZVVA must follow a set of rules when handling personal information. These rules govern:

- How we can collect personal information
- How we store personal information
- How we use and share personal information

REFLECTIONS OF THE PAST V6 RNZIR

The Withdrawal

Reflecting on the withdrawal of V6 from Nui Dat to Vung Tau on the 9th of October 1971 and the four weeks stay there was for me as the CSM a waste of bloody time. The worry of boredom with the potential for disciplinary havoc was a concern. Thankfully, the influence and leadership of the Platoon Sergeants and their Section Commanders helped to control any misconduct. The boss didn't want to know unless the offence was serious.

Before we moved to Vung Tau between 9 Oct and 7 Nov, the Coy was kept busy securing the eastern sector of Nui Dat and the Long Tan Rubber Plantation. Section patrols and ambushes were routine operational tasks that were planned to give the impression things were operationally normal. Those remaining in base set about quietly packing equipment. The nights were especially quiet and gave this eerie feeling akin to sadness. Though we were heading back to Singapore to families and friends, the thought of leaving this place was reflective of so many memories good and bad. It was sad.

The camp was to be left intact. Unexploded ammunition, grenades were dumped. The wire and mines surrounding the camp were left untouched as were the tents and sandbags. The Coy lines would be a ghost camp.

In support of our last few days there, we had a section of APC's in support. This group was led by a New Zealand Officer who allowed soldiers to have some fun hooning them around the camp road.

I don't think many slept that last night. I didn't. It was an early fly out next morning and walking to the plane I had a final look at a place that over the past seven months had always been such a welcoming sight after weeks on operations. But now..... Vung Tau!

We all knew what was on offer in Vung Tau. It was a time for creative thinking. We were allocated the R&R Centre in the middle of town. Platoons made up their own activities that included lots of beach time. At night they would spend time with the Australians at the Peter Babcoe Club doing what soldiers do or frequenting the

local bars. Those visits became less and less as money ran out. Acknowledging there was a small chance of some active action, security patrols were organised 24/7.

The Coy was also training for the final farewell parade. A competition was held to see who would have the shiniest spit polished boots for the parade. I have never seen in my whole military career anything like what was produced. Boots were spit polished from the toe cap to the top of the boot. On parade it was a special sight.

John Carde our Padre provided some diversion by adopting a local orphanage. The place was very dirty with just born babies left at the door. Soldiers from the Coy volunteered to go clean the place up. From memory I think it took two days and the soldiers were left to wonder how they could get basic furniture to make the place more liveable. The answer was at the Peter Babcoe Club where the Australians had stored everything ready to be shipped back to Australia. The boys reckoned they wouldn't miss a few beds, mattresses, blankets, pillows, sheets, a refrigerator (or 2) tables and chairs plus anything else they could lay their hands on. Our CQMS John Richardson used his influence to pull a few strings and to get what was needed.

Meanwhile all the Coy SNCO's had developed a relationship with American helicopter pilots and over a few drinks I spoke to a pilot and asked what it was like to fly in a cobra gun ship. He was a test pilot and was flying a cobra the next morning and invited me to fly with him. I jumped at the opportunity. Next morning after being picked up I was given a brief, provided with a helmet, gloves and settled into the gunner's seat. Once in the air he asked where I would like to go. I asked if we could fly over Nui Dat and so we did. The camp had been stripped. Almost nothing stood. Nui Dat as an operational base was no more. Some JNCO's were attached to US Shore Patrols and found that to be an experience.

In 2016 myself, Wayne Hutchinson and Tubby Nicholls from V6 took a group of year 12 students from Tikipunga High School to Vietnam, Malaysia and Singapore. We visited the area of our camp and found the remains of a defensive wire fence we had placed around us during our last few days there. That's all that remained.

And so, the last farewell parade alongside our Australian mates was held at Vung Tau before, on the 9th of December having ushered the Coy into the waiting C130 we left.

Well dear reader you are now aware of our Cartel and what our aims, dreams and aspirations are. We are totally focused on our fellow veterans and we do it

without the usual bullshit that quite often accompanies support offered from elsewhere. Come and join us for a visit, we are all house trained (well most of us are) and you won't walk away unhappy that's for sure. We thrive on bullshit stories so come along and tell us yours.
